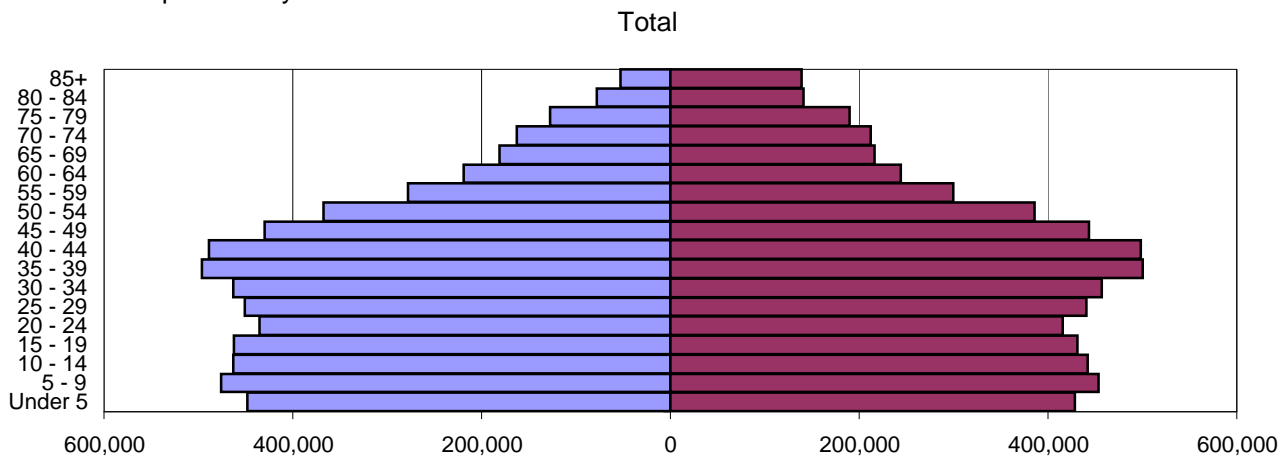
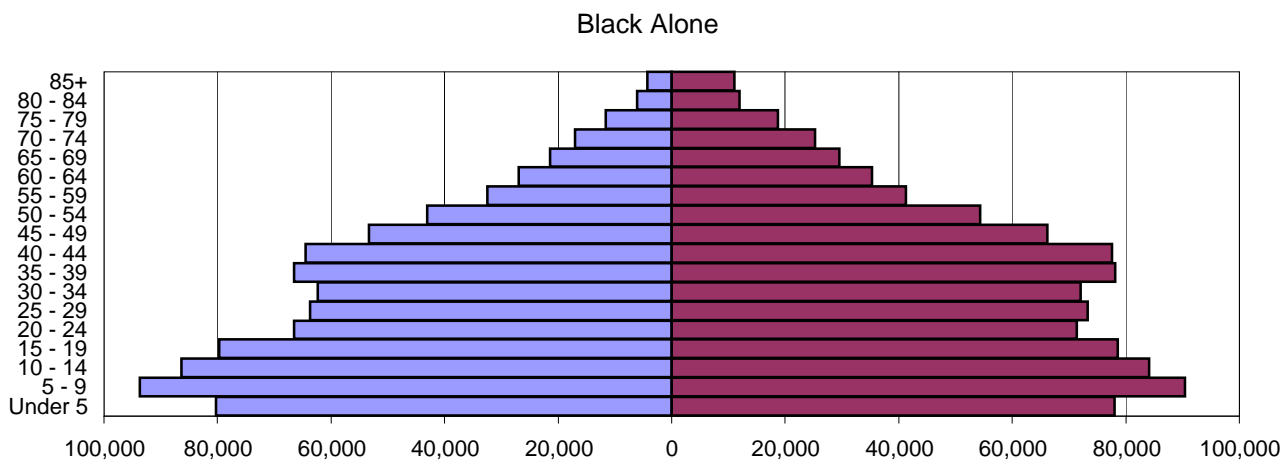


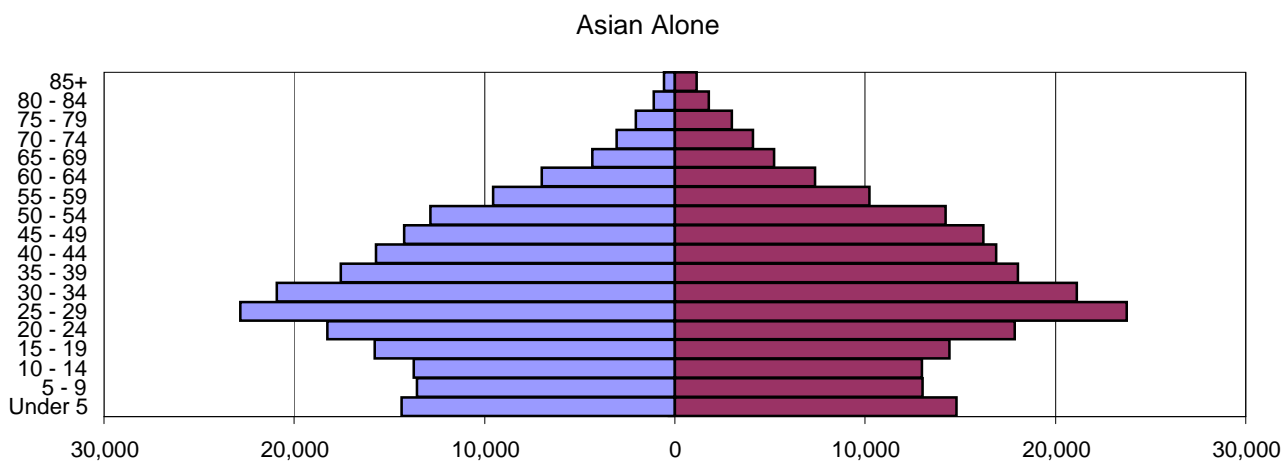
Illinois 2000 Population Pyramids

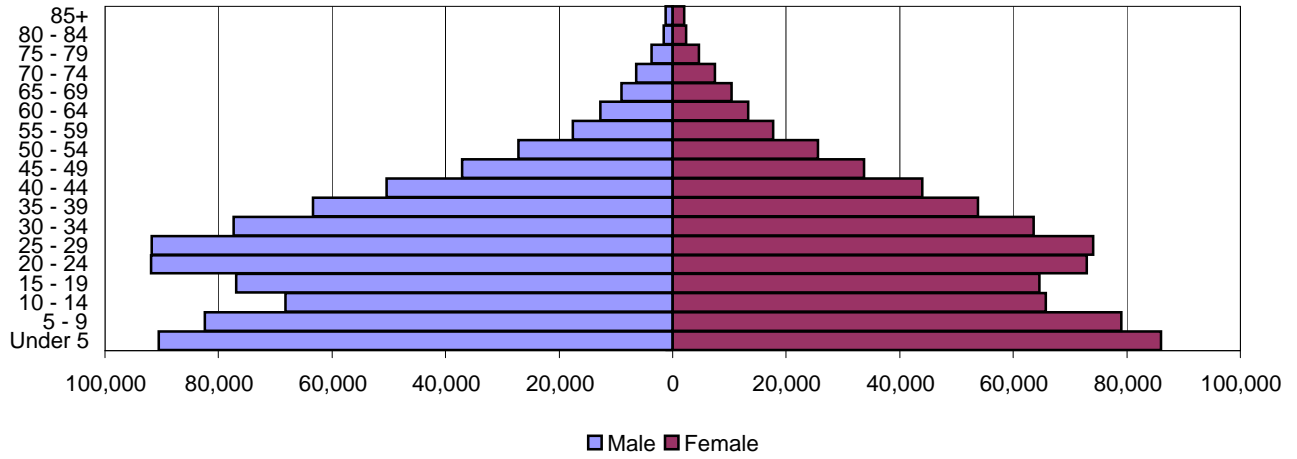

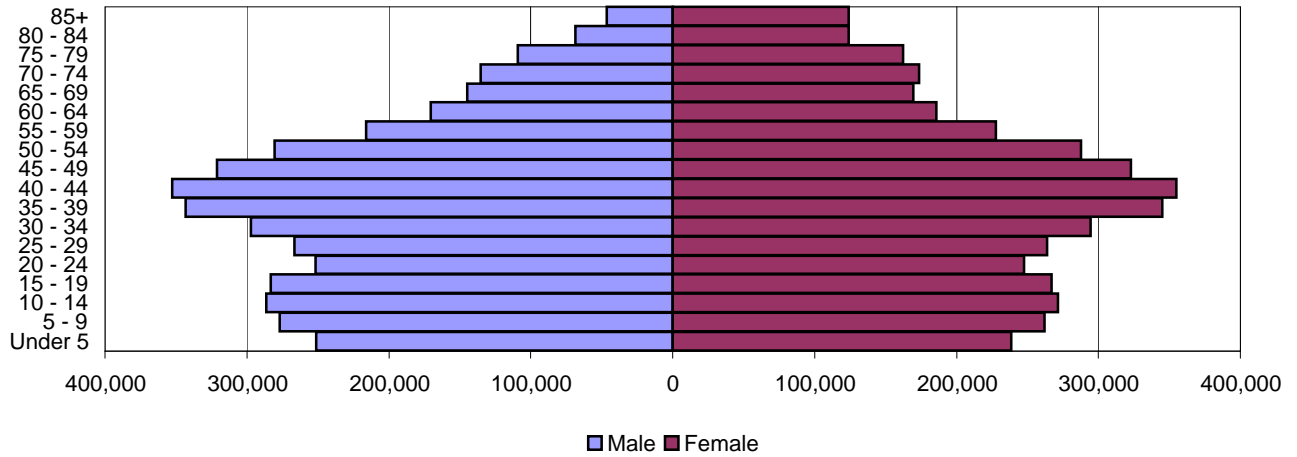

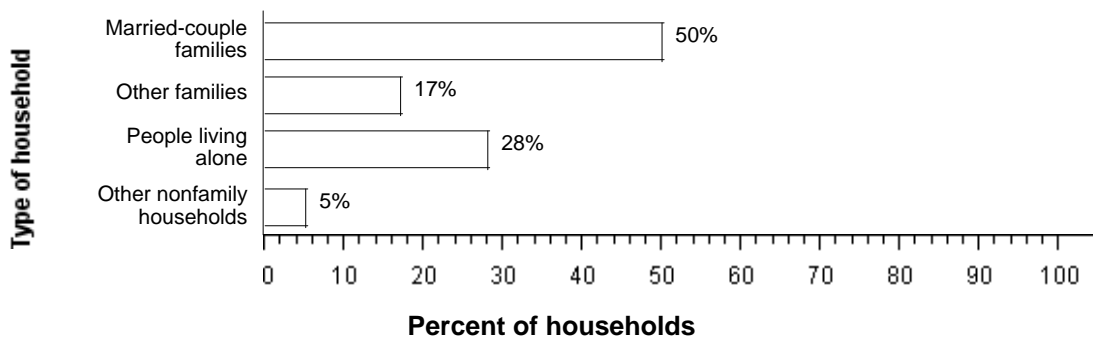
NOTE. Although the American Community Survey (ACS) produces population, demographic and housing unit estimates, it is the Census Bureau's Population Estimates Program that produces and disseminates the official estimates of the population for the nation, states, counties, cities and towns and estimates of housing units for states and counties.

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2006 there were 4.7 million households in Illinois. The average household size was 2.7 people.

Families made up 67 percent of the households in Illinois. This figure includes both married-couple families (50 percent) and other families (17 percent). Nonfamily households made up 33 percent of all households in Illinois. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in Illinois in 2006



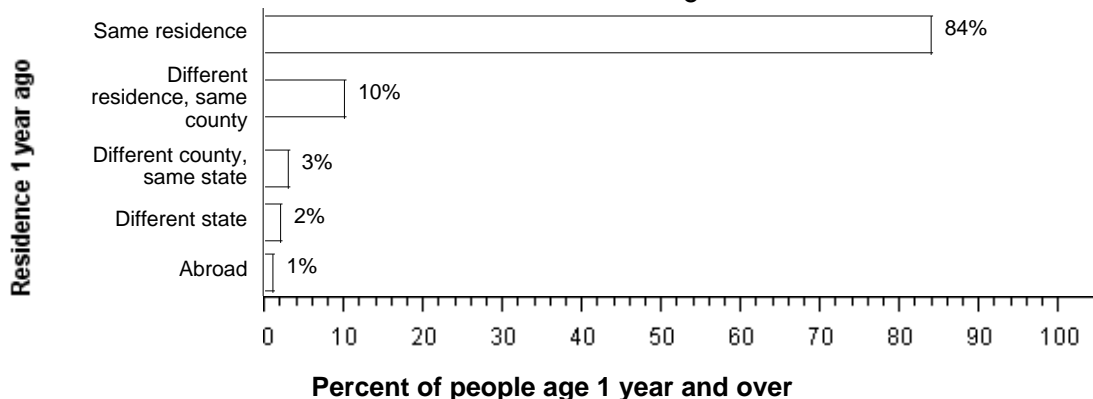

NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Fourteen percent of the people living in Illinois in 2006 were foreign born. Eighty-six percent was native, including 67 percent who were born in Illinois.

Among people at least five years old living in Illinois in 2006, 22 percent spoke a language other than English at home. Of those speaking a language other than English at home, 58 percent spoke Spanish and 42 percent spoke some other language; 45 percent reported that they did not speak English "very well."

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2006, 84 percent of the people at least one year old living in Illinois were living in the same residence one year earlier; 10 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 3 percent from another county in the same state, 2 percent from another state, and 1 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Illinois in 2006

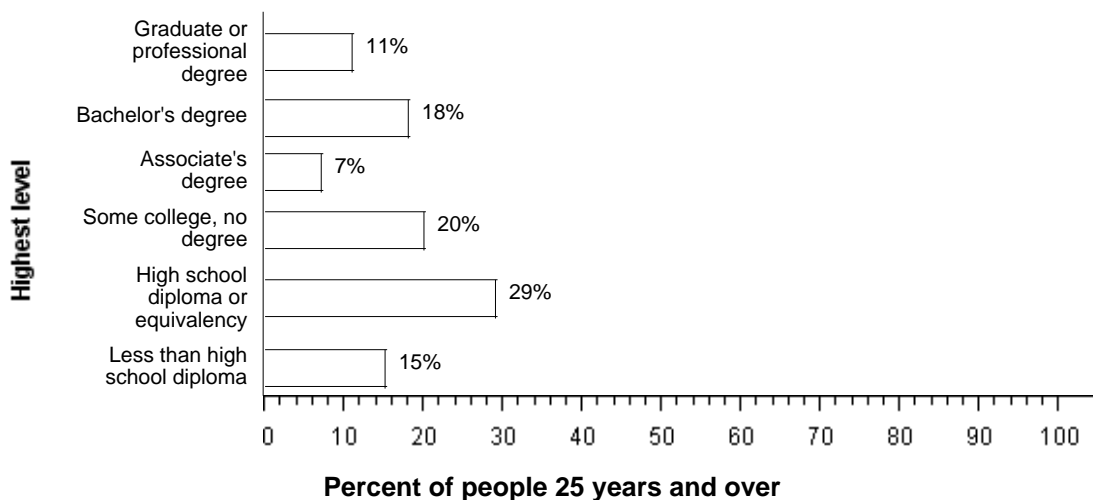

EDUCATION: In 2006, 85 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 29 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Fifteen percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in Illinois was 3.5 million in 2006. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 421,000 and elementary or high school enrollment was 2.2 million children. College or graduate school enrollment was 939,000.

The Educational Attainment of People in Illinois in 2006

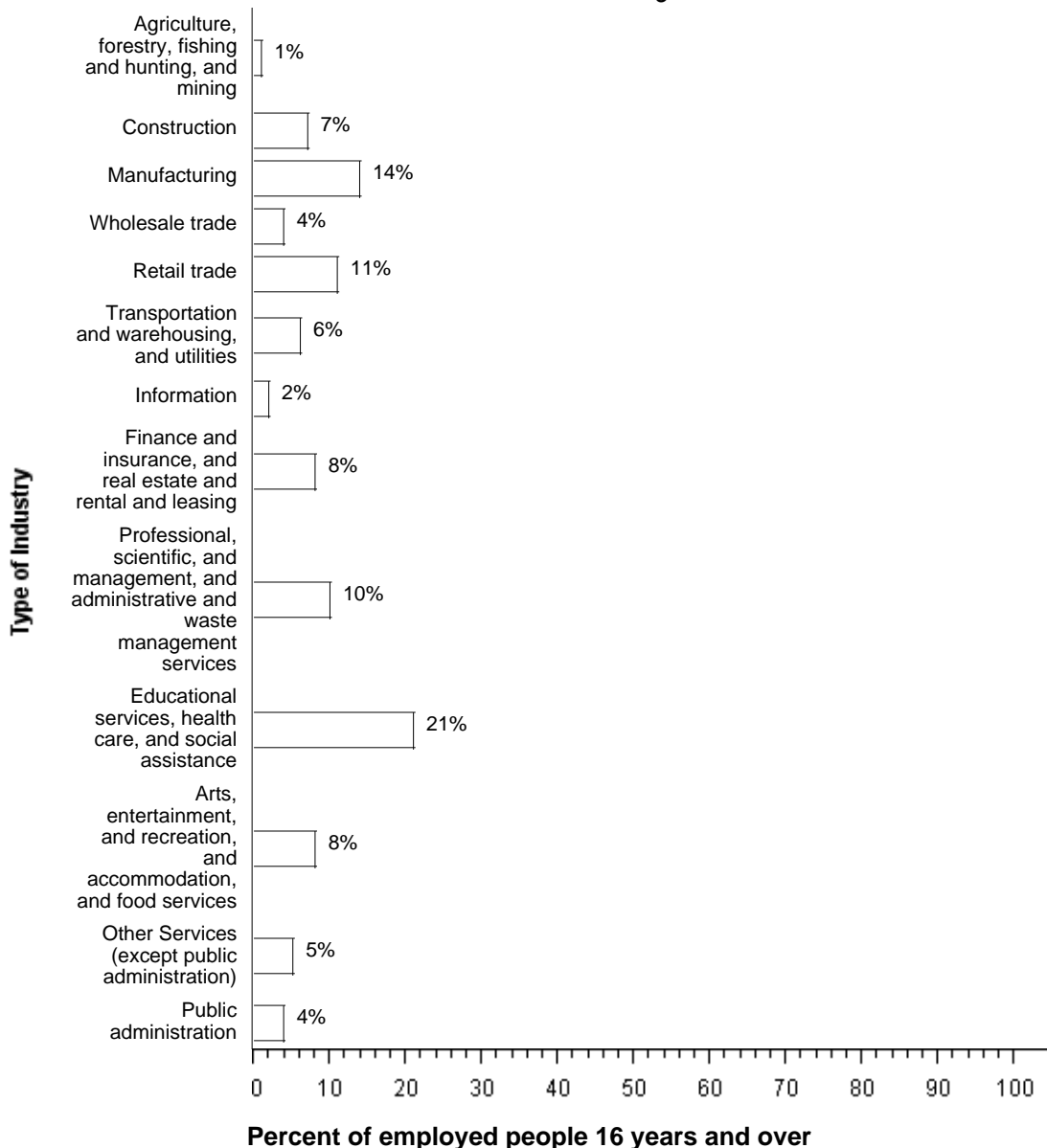

DISABILITY: In Illinois, among people at least five years old in 2006, 13 percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from 6 percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to 10 percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to 40 percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2006, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in Illinois were Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 21 percent, and Manufacturing, 14 percent.

OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 34 percent; Sales and office occupations, 26 percent; Service occupations, 16 percent; Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 15 percent; and Construction, extraction, maintenance and repair occupations, 8 percent. Eighty-two percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 13 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 5 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

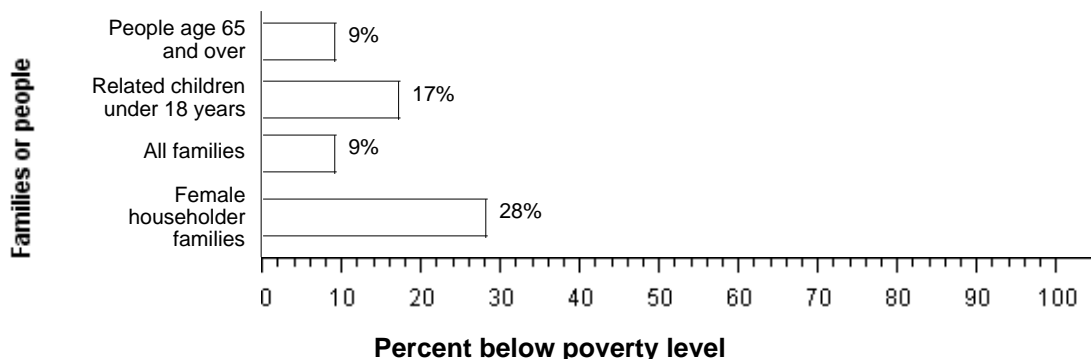
TRAVEL TO WORK: Seventy-four percent of Illinois workers drove to work alone in 2006, 9 percent carpooled, 8 percent took public transportation, and 4 percent used other means. The remaining 4 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 27.9 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in Illinois was \$52,006. Eighty-one percent of the households received earnings and 16 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Twenty-five percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$14,223. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: In 2006, 12 percent of people were in poverty. Seventeen percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty

level, compared with 9 percent of people 65 years old and over. Nine percent of all families and 28 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.

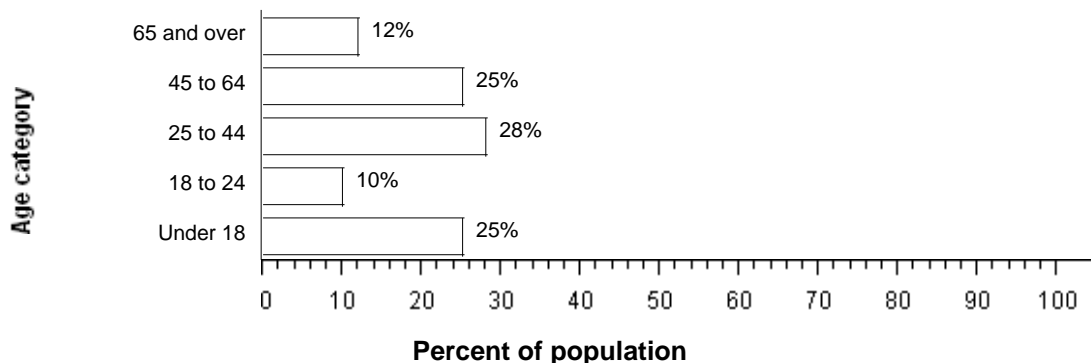
Poverty Rates in Illinois in 2006

POPULATION OF Illinois: In 2006, Illinois had a total population of 12.8 million - 6.5 million (51 percent) females and 6.3 million (49 percent) males. The median age was 35.7 years. Twenty-five percent of the population was under 18 years and 12 percent was 65 years and older.

The Age Distribution of People in Illinois in 2006

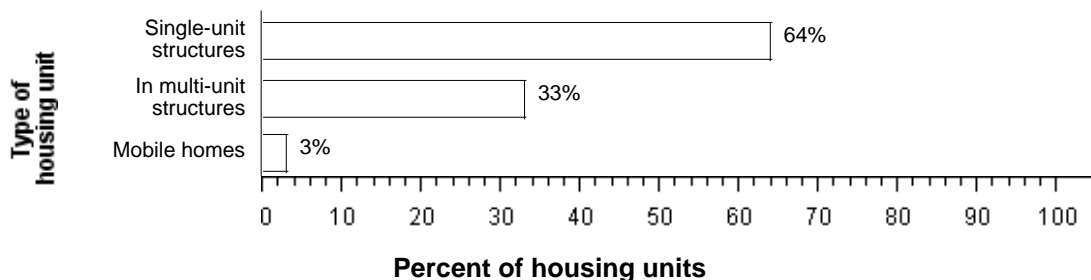

For people reporting one race alone, 72 percent was White; 15 percent was Black or African American; less than 0.5 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 4 percent was Asian; less than 0.5 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 9 percent was Some other race. Two percent reported Two or more races. Fifteen percent of the people in Illinois was Hispanic. Sixty-five percent of the people in Illinois was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Illinois had a total of 5.2 million housing units, 9 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 64 percent was in single-unit structures, 33 percent was in multi-unit structures, and 3 percent was mobile homes. Nineteen percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

The Types of Housing Units in Illinois in 2006

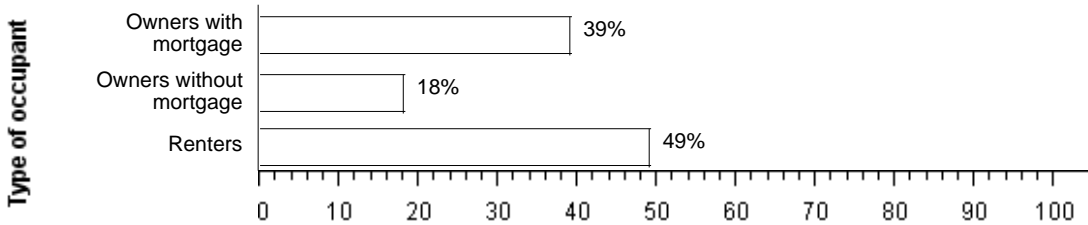

OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Illinois had 4.7 million occupied housing units - 3.3 million (70 percent) owner occupied and 1.4 million (30 percent) renter occupied. Six percent of the households did not have telephone service and 10 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Multi Vehicle households were not rare. Thirty-eight percent had two vehicles and another 17 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$1,566, nonmortgaged owners \$490, and renters \$761. Thirty-nine percent of owners with mortgages, 18 percent of owners without mortgages, and 49 percent of renters in Illinois spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.
